THE FIRST HOME GAME

We got the first point of the second set after a long volley. We have a few overthinks, finding ourselves under the other team, but we quickly make it up after spikes and serves that speak nothing of their inexperience.

Peecher does great at hitting in the front and back. We serve again when we have 14 points, and thanks to C. Ramey and N. Clevenger digging deep we get some great serves, making the leap from 14 to 20. At 21 to 19, Unioto calls first time out of the set. The set ends quickly after that, and we win after a missed serve by the guests; 25 to 23.





The guest's libero serves first, making the first point. After that the battle is constantly going back and forth. The game has been neck and neck the entire game, and this set is no different. There's no way to tell which way the game will go. Nathaniel Clevenger dives, sets, and blocks with a spirited attitude that helps his team. The volleys last for what seems like hours, and the fans are tiring in wait to see the end. Eagles call time at 17 to 22. After the call the Eagles continue to struggle as Unioto gains back its confidence. They try hard, but Eagles call time out again at 17 to 24. We start fighting again and earn four more points, served by N. Clevenger, and Unioto call time at 21 to 24 points. The tension is up, and after a long fight the guests win the set, 22 to 25. It was still an exceptional comeback on the Eagles behalf.

In the immense excitement of it all, we have made it to a fifth set! Coach Vitatoe shouts to his team as they leave the huddle, "Have fun, guys. Have fun."

The encouragement seems to work and we get the first point! After S. Clevenger spikes on the guests, we get another point, and the serve goes back and forth twice. Then J. Beverly is up for serve, and he makes his debut with perfect overhand serves, making the crowd wild. Unioto calls time at 7 to 2, but they can't break the teams spirits. It's a heart pounding sight, as J. Beverly serves 12 straight points, earning us a grand victory: 15 to 2!










STUDENT TESTIMONY

Many of you guys who go to RCCA know who I am, just because I have told this story to everyone I meet so they know who I am. I grew up in a small town-Gadsden,AL- similar to Chillicothe, OH. My biological mother was raped at the age of 16 and found out she was pregnant, and had me at 17. So, I never knew who my biological father was. All through her life she struggled. She was heavily involved in drugs and so were her parents. She didn't know any other life, just the paradigm that she was raised in. Because of this, it was a struggle for her to get her life together. She always believed that there was God but never really went to church or anything. When I was five years old, my mother had my twin brothers. About 10 months later, they were placed in the home that we remain in now. This was a loving home. Built on the foundation of Christ. Soon after they received my brothers, they ended up with me because the Department of Human Resources had reports of Neglect and Illegal drug use in the home. So I moved into this nice home with a couple who were unable to have children. My parents, mostly my adoptive mother, said that I was a gift from God, and I always believed that until at one point in my life I didn't.

While I was living here in this home, it was loving. It was really weird for me to accept. There were not any burnt spoons laying around and there was no yelling at each other. It was just peaceful. I was always told that I needed to be a Christian, but they were never the parents that forced you. I went to church with them every Sunday and did weekly Bible Studies. When I was around the age of eight, my parents told me that I knew right from wrong. If I wanted to be Christian, they were fine with it and could continue to go to church. If I didn't want to be a Christian I didn't have to, but I could still be respectful and go to church. So I decided that I wanted to be a Christian so I got saved.

On February 4, 2018 my mother and I found my brother dead in the morning. I was 10 at the time. My faith got really shaky but I still tried as hard as I could keep faith in God.

In 2019, we moved to Ohio. I started to go to church with my Grandmother, Joy Martin, at Lighthouse Baptist Church. I really liked this church and found the environment kind and helpful. I even met my best friend at the time, Isabella Ramey. She really helped me get closer to God and always made sure that I was doing Bible Studies. During this time I took my faith seriously. I even got baptized. Everything was going well at this point in my life.

On August 20, 2021 my mother passed away from Covid-19 in the hospital. I actually watched as they pulled the plug and her passing. I knew she would have done the same thing. After this I quit going to church and I just went on a rampage. It messed with my head in a way I can't describe. I was really mad at God and even turned to Satan to try and help me but nothing did. I was just lost and felt like I had no meaning. So, I started to self-harm. I then decided that I didn't believe in God or Satan. I was an atheist. But that changed when I started to attend RCCA.

When I first started attending RCCA, everyone already knew that I was atheist. They never judged or anything. They treated me normally like anyone else. I was a little shocked at this because I thought they were going to be all over me asking so many questions but they didn't. They accepted me...for who I was. When I started to go to Bible Class, Mrs.Tami Hacker really helped me open my eyes. The way she taught the word of Christ really helped me.

Just recently I got saved. And I am proud to say that I am a Child of God. I really think that most people can relate to me on some level and I love that. Being able to help people I absolutely love. There are two people in that I would like to give a special thanks to:

Mrs.Tami Hacker and Khayta Diongue. Thank you guys for never giving up on me! If you are not sure you are saved, please turn to someone you trust and ask questions. You never know, there might be someone just like you going through similar situations.
